

FROM THE CEO

Stronger Together: New Leaders and Partnerships Powering Lasting Change

Dear Friends, Families, and Supporters,

Education Rights Counsel was founded on a simple but powerful belief: every child deserves access not only to education, but also to skilled advocates who protect their rights, secure necessary services, and improve their educational outcomes.

Education law remains complex and everchanging, and while 2024 brought new challenges, it also strengthened our resolve. I am proud to share that we continue to turn challenges into opportunities, advancing our mission with growth, momentum, and measurable impact.

In 2024, we concluded a successful three-year strategic plan that elevated education rights across Nebraska. With your support, we represented 291 students and families; provided 191 free consultations; and trained more than 1,700 people statewide. These numbers reflect the tangible difference your support makes each day. We now represent clients in all three juvenile courts across Nebraska and are preparing to begin our first cases in county courts in 2025.

To meet this growth, we welcomed new staff, including Associate Attorney, Erin Dolph, who specializes in juvenile actions and Maria Smith, Legal Specialist, who helps facilitate consultations and provides legal support. We were equally honored to welcome Yvonnda Summers, Robert O'Neil, and Kate Gallagher to our Board of Directors, whose leadership ensures we remain accountable and forward-looking.

Our partnership with the University of Nebraska– Lincoln College of Law flourished in 2024. Through the Nebraska Children's Justice and Legal Advocacy Center, we provide training, consultation, and advocacy support to students and attorneys. This work builds the foundation for durable, statewide education advocacy. Similarly, our partnership with Douglas County solidifies structural change to ensure children in detention also access much-needed education support, and our work with UNO's Juvenile Justice Institute helps students approach their work holistically.

We continue to actively engage with the concerns and ideas of beneficiaries, staff, and partner organizations, ensuring their perspectives help guide and improve our work. We are deeply grateful for the insights of our advisory boards and the collaborative home we share at the Barbara Weitz Community Engagement Center, which strengthens our connections with students and other nonprofits. Enduring impact requires not only new ideas, but also the systems and practices to carry them forward. By investing in people, partnerships, and infrastructure, Education Rights Counsel is building an organization prepared to adapt, thrive, and serve Nebraska for years to come.

From expulsion to early graduation

How persistent advocacy helped Thomas Galgerud, Jr. stay in school and thrive

Thomas Galgerud, Jr.'s high school diploma didn't come easily. After unmet Individualized Education Program (IEP) goals, a stretch of suspensions, and an expulsion, his educational future looked bleak. But with persistent family and ERC advocacy, the education system began delivering the supports he needed, and Thomas pushed through to graduate 13 months early.

"We struggled a lot ... getting IEP supports in the classroom," said Thomas's father, Tom Galgerud. "Then he had some disciplinary stuff."

With each suspension, Thomas fell further behind. "Every time I got suspended, they wouldn't give me any help. I wouldn't be able to do any schoolwork," Thomas said.

"I think that's where we first started struggling,"
Tom said. "Thomas got a 10-day suspension
sophomore year, and they sent him home for 10 days.
Then he went back to school and tried to get caught
up, but he was so buried."

Tom tried to work with the school to get his son's IEP requirements met, but made little progress.

"We'd have these IEP meetings ... and nothing really seemed to come of it."

So he reached out to ERC and was connected with Lauren Micek Vargas.

"Lauren seemed to have Thomas's interests athand where nobody else really seemed to," Tom said. "When Lauren got involved, she made sure the school was doing the proper meetings. She made sure what was talked about in those meetings was being done in school."

With Lauren's help, Thomas began receiving the supports required by his IEP, even during suspensions.

"We found out from Lauren that [sending schoolwork home] during a suspension is required by the IEP," said Tom. "I don't think [the school] ever acknowledged that until Lauren was involved."

Unfortunately, disciplinary issues proved too much, and Thomas was expelled. To prevent further educational delays, he enrolled at the Sarpy County Juvenile Justice Center.

With a new school, proper supports, and a fresh start, Thomas began to thrive. He set aggressive academic goals, aiming to make up for lost time. Once caught up, he maintained the pace and ultimately graduated early.

Now, with his high school career complete, Thomas is looking forward to a bright future: finding a job, turning 18, and studying a trade at Metro Community College.

"I'm very impressed with what Lauren is doing," Tom said.

"Thomas's mom and I've had IEP meetings and school meetings since elementary school, and we're the only two advocates for Thomas's education. And that's the way it is for most kids. When you hit a roadblock or a dead end, it just feels like no one is listening, no one is helping," he said.

"It's nice to have someone like Lauren representing, understanding what we're going through and fighting for Thomas's rights as well."

2024 Aequitas Award Winners

"Aequitas" is the Latin word for justice and equality. Each year, ERC recognizes three advocates who have demonstrated dedicated to advancing educational equity for Nebraska's children.

► COMMUNITY CHAMPION

Chris Rodgers is a respected, practical political voice seeking to advance a new era of equity and progress in Omaha, Douglas County, and the surrounding metropolitan area. As a Douglas County Commissioner since 2005, Rodgers is focused on building a post-pandemic local public health system, improving the social determinants of health, strengthening adult corrections programs, reforming the juvenile justice system, and wisely spending taxpayer dollars. As president of the National Association of Counties (NACo) in 2012-13, Rodgers brought national attention to two critical issues: smart justice and cybersecurity. His Smart Justice Initiative continues to build knowledge and capacity for successful criminal justice policies and practices among the nation's counties. Rodgers graduated from Creighton in 1992 with a Bachelor of Arts in journalism and a Master of Business Administration in 1999. Rodgers also received a Master of Public Administration from the University of Nebraska at Omaha in 2002. He is currently a part-time student at the Creighton School of Law.


